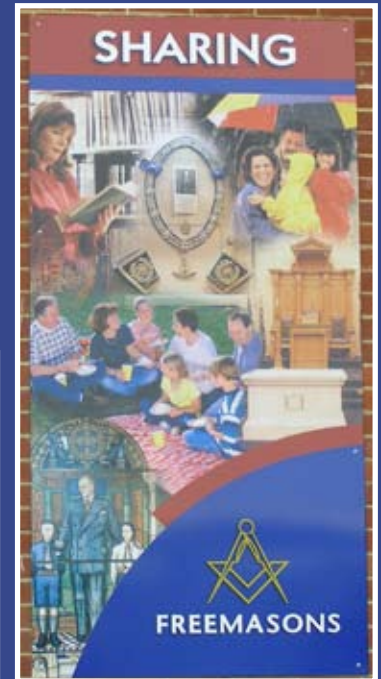

Christmas message from the Grand Master

Friendship - a privilege to share

In each of the last two years, I opened my Christmas message with two verses which come from the well known and loved Christmas carol, "While shepherds watched their flocks by night". I went on to develop my messages around the themes of 'peace' and 'goodwill'.

The words of the carol in question were written by Nahum Tate, an Irish poet and dramatist who lived from 1652 to 1715. He wrote other popular hymns, and the following quotation comes from his writings:

"Friendship's the privilege of private men; for wretched greatness knows no blessing so substantial".

Friendship is important to us as Freemasons and as private individuals.

As Freemasons we are enjoined to avoid topics of discussion which might cause disharmony. In the final address to the Brethren in our Installation ceremonies the Installing Master recommends that brethren "enjoy every satisfaction and delight that disinterested friendship can bring".

I was once asked what this recommendation meant, and explained that disinterested and uninterested have different meanings, with disinterested meaning uninfluenced by self-interest.

Christmas is a time when friends are especially important to us. We send greetings to friends and relations with some of whom we only communicate once a year.

Ann and I have maintained an exchange of Christmas greetings and letters with some people we encountered for only a brief period twenty five years or so ago.

These include a young woman in Canada who was profoundly deaf, who was in the same railway carriage with us during a trip from Vancouver to Banff.

We were only able to communicate with her in writing.

On another occasion, we met an elderly woman at a bus stop in Copenhagen. Amazingly, a few weeks later we met her again, at another bus stop in Edinburgh.

Our Christmas list also includes another elderly woman met during an overnight stay in a boarding house adjacent to the bus depot in Ottawa.

On the list are old school friends from fifty years ago. And, of course, relatives who are our friends in a very special way.

Freemasonry blesses us with friends. Let us remember that not everyone is so blessed and to reach out the hand of friendship to those who might otherwise be alone.

Ann and I wish all members of the Craft and their families a joyful and peaceful Christmas.

Tasmania's Grand Master-elect, RW Bro Norm Cooper (pictured at left), now in semi-retirement, maintains his extensive interest in Craft freemasonry and many other Masonic Orders, as well as continuing his hobbies of gardening, fishing and boating.

Appointed Deputy Grand Master in 2005, RW Bro Cooper said he had three enjoyable years in that role, travelling to all parts of the State and getting to know the brethren.

"I am enthusiastic about the future of freemasonry in Tasmania and heartened by the number and calibre of candidates who have been joining our ranks lately," he said.

Deputy Grand Master-designate

The Deputy Grand Master Designate, VW Bro Campbell (John) Wallace (pictured at right) has been in Tasmania for seven years, having moved to Wynyard from Northern Queensland.

He is married to Elva and they have two children - Kerry and Ken - five grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

VW Bro Wallace was born at Home Hill in Northern Queensland in 1943.

He was a seasonal worker in the sugar industry, then worked in a stock feed business for nineteen years, initially as a truck driver, rising to manager of its manufacturing plant for several years.

For the next fourteen years he managed a fertiliser and chemical supply company.

His recreational interests included rugby league as a youth and he spent some time as a boat owner and recreational saltwater fisherman in Northern Queensland.

VW Bro Wallace was initiated into Home Hill Lodge, No. 237 UGLQ in 1978, and was its Master in 1987, 1989, 1992 and 1996.

He served as a Steward in the District Grand Lodge of North Queensland in 1991-92 and held various other offices up to District Grand Director of Ceremonies in 1999-2000.

He was also a member of the District Grand Board of Benevolence in 1992-95.

VW Bro Wallace joined Royal Arch freemasonry at Inkerman in Queensland.

After retiring to Tasmania in 2000, VW Bro Wallace affiliated with Emu Lodge, served as Master in 2002 and 2005, and in 2007 he affiliated with Poulett Lodge.

He has continued his Royal Arch interests in the Ramsay Chapter in Burnie and is also active in several other Orders in Tasmania.



In the Grand Lodge of Tasmania he served as Grand Standard Bearer in 2002 and various offices up to Grand Director of Ceremonies in 2006. He is currently Grand Inspector of Lodges/ North West.

It was a proud occasion for me to again be there when he was invested Assistant Grand Master and, as one would expect with Brian, he was word-perfect in the performance of his duties.

The couple plan to attend the Tasmanian Grand Installation in February 2008, and Lodge Esk members hope Brian will be able to "return to his Mother" (Lodge) during that visit.

Brian was initiated into Lodge Esk in September 1967; he progressed through all the offices and was installed as Worshipful Master in October 1976. The lodge prospered under his leadership.

A builder by trade, Brian was continually assisting with maintenance and general cleaning-up around Launceston's Brisbane Street masonic building.

Often seeing that something needed to be done, he would quietly go ahead and do it; few people were aware of his efforts.

In 1981 he was appointed Grand Superintendent of Works of the Grand Lodge of Tasmania.

However, the following year he and Gayle decided to move to Queensland, settling on the Gold Coast in the Burleigh area - a loss to Tasmanian freemasonry and Lodge Esk but a big gain for Queensland.

Brian retained his membership with Lodge Esk for many years while at the same time establishing himself in the Burleigh Lodge, which is one of the most successful in Queensland, with as many as forty Master Masons in its membership.

Legacy of 'positives'

Sad as it is for a lodge to hand in its charter, the brethren of the former Lake Lodge No. 29 TC were able to arrange for some "positives" to come from the closure.

The Lodge had for many years supported the Longford Primary School with an annual award, and the former members decided to continue that support in a different form.

The former Secretary of Lake Lodge, VW Bro Wilf Johnston, said it was decided to make a fifteen-hundred dollar donation to the school.

The money had been deposited and interest payments would be used to fund an annual prize for a student chosen by the principal and staff.

The prize, to be known as "The Masonic Award", would be based on the criteria that the selected student selected follows masonic principles.

Each award will be accompanied by a certificate displaying the Lake Lodge Centenary logo (1905-2005).

Another "positive" coming from the closure of Lake Lodge is that the masonic

canopies formerly used in its building at Longford have been handed over to the Heather Hall Company in Newstead.

The 'last original' retires

After 32 years on the Board of Management of the Masonic Homes of Northern Tasmania, VW Bro Henry Harris - the "last of the originals" - has "hung up his badge" and retired.

Henry was elected a Lodge Representative in 1975 and subsequently served on the planning committee for the construction of the Masonic Peace Haven complex at Penquite Road, Norwood, and the Masonic Garden Village independent living units, which commenced operations in 1986.

Henry served continuously as a Director on the Peace Haven Board and until October 2006 was also a Director on the Board of the Fred French Home.

He was Chairman of Peace Haven for many of those years and latterly served as the Vice-Chairman.

At a special presentation during the Annual General Meeting of the Masonic Peace Haven Lodge Representatives on

October 3, W Bro Ian Green, Chairman of Peace Haven, paid tribute to Henry's long and distinguished career as a Director.

"He has seen this facility develop from a bare paddock to what it is today. During his tenure, this entire complex was built. What a magnificent achievement!" W Bro Green said.

"The fine Peace Haven and Fred French facilities throughout the Tamar Valley bear witness to Henry's dedication and leadership.

"He is a fine Mason and has done a grand job. Well done, Henry!"

MW Bro Paul Hodges, Chairman of the Fred French Board, said that during his time as Chairman of Peace Haven, VW Bro Harris and the Board faced some extremely trying times.

"However, he always managed to find solutions to those problems and I applaud him for the service he has given to the



Masonic Homes of Northern Tasmania in particular, and generally to aged care throughout Tasmania".

A gold watch and a framed Certificate of Appreciation were presented to VW Bro Harris (see photo above), who said: "I've had a wonderful time! It is a vibrant organisation and I am sure that it will go a long way in the future."

The Board is not allowing Henry too much rest in his retirement, because it has asked him to help prepare a history of the Homes for the archives.

Gift from Lodge Phoenix

Masonic Peace Haven recently received a "two-part gift" from Lodge Phoenix - a richly illustrated book for the waiting room coffee table, plus a donation of \$150 raised during charity collections in the lodge's First Degree ceremonies.

The book, *Freemasonry - A Celebration of the Craft*, comprises more than one hundred pages detailing the origins, history and meaning of freemasonry.

Just one of the interesting facts to be found in it is that "on August 5, 1884, the then Grand Master of Masons in New York, William A. Brodie, laid the cornerstone of the pedestal of the Statue of Liberty with full Masonic ceremony".

The Worshipful Master of Lodge Phoenix, VW Bro Ian Blair, along with W Bro Greg Parkinson, presented the book to the Chairman of Masonic Peace Haven, W Bro Ian Green, and the Chief Executive Officer of the Masonic Homes of Northern Tasmania, Mr Kerry Ollington. (See photo).

The lodge representatives said the book presentation highlighted the commitment of Lodge Phoenix to the masonic education of its members and the general public.

Lodge Phoenix is the first European style dining lodge in Tasmania and the first Tasmanian Lodge to have been consecrated in the Twenty-first Century.

Around the World

Progress in Mauritius

The recently appointed Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Tasmania near to the Grand Lodge of Mauritius (Grande Loge de Maurice) has advised of the progress of freemasonry in the island nation.

RW Bro Regis Finette says there are now nine lodges making up the Grand Lodge; the newest is Lodge Unity, the only one of the nine to work in English.

Mauritius is a bilingual country but many of the descendants of Indian and Chinese immigrants are more at ease with English than with French.

RW Bro Finette is the WM of Lodge Unity which will work a translation of a French Rectified Scottish Rite ritual.

It proved a real challenge to obtain a suitable English translation of this ritual.

Benefits for Irish children

In 1975 Irish freemasonry's Girls' School was sold and a Masonic Girls' Benefit Fund was established with the money raised. A similar Masonic Boys' Benefit Fund was also established.

The two funds now have assets in excess of thirty million pounds.

In 2005 they paid out a total of 560,000 pounds to assist with education up to and including Master's Degree level, and the welfare of the children of deceased and distressed brethren.

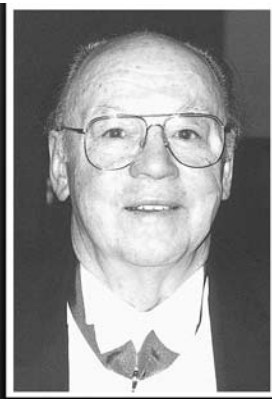
The Funds were at that time supporting 135 boys and 189 girls together with another 70 mature-age daughters of deceased brethren.

The Prestonian lectures are the only lectures held under the authority of The United Grand Lodge of England. Distinguished lecturers are appointed by Trustees of the Prestonian Fund.

In 2006 the title of the lecture by W Bro G. S. Angell was *The Victoria Cross - Freemasons Band of Brothers.*

The 2007 lecturer is RW Bro Dr R. B. F. Khambatta (Pakistan) and his topic is *Grand Secretaries 1813 - 1980.*

The appointee for 2008 (W Bro R. D. T. Sillett) has chosen to speak on *The Language of the Ritual.*

New UGLE position

At the annual Investiture of the United Grand Lodge of England on April 25, 2007, RW Bro Alan Englefield was invested as the first Grand Chancellor of the UGLE. His task is to coordinate activities concerning international relations.

The rebirth of freemasonry in Eastern Europe, the Baltic and the Balkans has greatly increased the workload.

The nature of modern communications and the ease of travel means that the leisurely style of former times is no longer appropriate.

The Grand Chancellor emblem and jewel show a terrestrial globe symbolising masonry universal, with clasped hands depicting fraternal relations and brotherly love.

Turmoil in Russia

Often we accentuate the positives and leave the negatives, hoping that they will wither and decay. Unfortunately, it must be admitted, freemasons sometimes create turmoil within their own ranks.

This has happened in Russia where two conflicting groups have failed to reconcile their differences.

Even after a specially-appointed international group of observers (intending to be peace makers) from England, America and France attended a joint meeting of interested parties in June 2007, the schism remains.

The executive secretary of the World Conference of Masonic Grand Lodges, RW Bro Thomas Jackson, was a member of the international group.

He says the legitimate and regular Grand Lodge of Russia is led by MW Bro Andrey Bogdanov as Grand Master, with VW Bro Vladimir Nikitin as Grand Secretary.

Peace Lodge celebrations

On August 11, 2007, the Lodge of Peace celebrated its 150th year, with a regular meeting attended by the Grand Master and his team, followed by a gathering open to guests and ladies.

VW Bro Ken Knight outlined the history of the lodge from its consecration at Longford in 1857, the journeys to Stanley, then Hamilton-on-Forty (now known as Forth), and its present location in Penguin.

The celebrations then moved to the Penguin Surf Club rooms for a dinner and entertainment.

The Worshipful Master, W Bro Brian Jones, called on Mrs Tup Butler - the widow of W Bro Lance Butler, and Bro Rex Ling - the longest serving member (sixty years) - to cut a ceremonial cake.

At the Eleventh Biannual Sessions of the Order of the Eastern Star in Adelaide in June 2007, Sister Helen Williams from Wynyard was installed as Deputy Grand Matron of Tasmania. She is a member of the OES Tasman Chapter.

Sister Williams and Bro Bell (pictured at right) have two-year terms, which will end at the Twelve Biannual Sessions in Sydney in June 2009.

Along with the Deputy Grand Matrons Committee, Sister Williams and Bro Bell comprise the governing



body for the Order of the Eastern Star in Tasmania.

Both have embarked on what they feel will be an exciting and harmonious two years travelling around the State, renewing friendships with other masonic orders and charity organisations, and visiting OES Chapters in other States.

Your support and encouragement made it possible for substantial funds to be donated to masonic homes in the north and south of Tasmania.

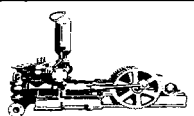
Now that the production of the 2008 Diary has been passed to a committee of The Pacific Lodge, we are confident you will give them the same support.

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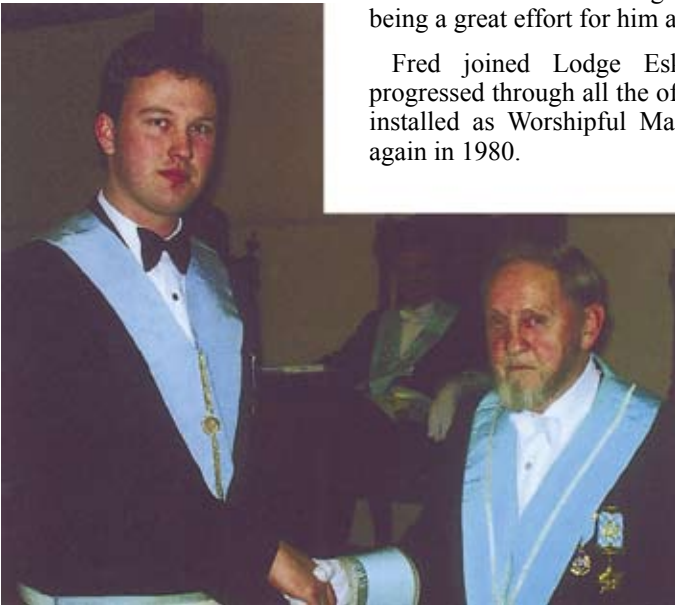

RW Bro Fred Gulliford (pictured left), who passed to the Grand Lodge Above on June 28, 2007, was a tireless worker in the Craft. His death is a great loss to freemasonry in general and to Lodge Esk in particular.

Fred was presented with his Forty Year Certificate on March 29, 2007 by RW Bro Colin Moore representing the Grand Master, supported by several Lodge Esk Members.

The presentation was made at Fred's home, and he insisted on standing to receive it - this being a great effort for him at the time.

Fred joined Lodge Esk in 1965 and progressed through all the offices until he was installed as Worshipful Master in 1973 and again in 1980.



He was nominated Grand Steward in 1988, became Grand Pursuivant in 1991, Grand Deacon in 1992, Grand Director of Ceremonies in 1994 and was elected Grand Warden in 1995.

Fred also served on the Board of General Purposes for many years and was awarded the Grand Lodge Order of Distinguished Service.

At the Lodge Esk regular meeting on July 24 the lodge's traditional one-minute silence was observed and RW Bro Moore presented the eulogy, after which W Bro Don Simpson presented Fred's grandson, Bro Nathan Groves, with Fred's Lodge Esk Jewel (see photo at lower left).

Bro Groves thanked the brethren for their support and attendance at Fred's funeral, which was "Grand" indeed and Bro Nathan's presentation of the Masonic Oration and Eulogy very moving.

Many members of the family and non-masonic visitors were impressed with the masonic part of the ceremony, and the placing the sprig of acacia and the respect and friendship shown among the brethren present was very special.

A large number of masons were present to farewell a man who was loved and respected by all who knew him.

Where was 'Mother'?

Recently at Macquarie Lodge in Hobart, the officer presenting a Sixty Year Bar described the recipient, W Bro J. D. Clarke, as "the only Mason I know whose mother Lodge performed none of his degrees".

In 1947, after W Bro Clarke was accepted as a candidate by St Andrew Lewis Lodge in Launceston.

His initiation coincided with an official visit by Victory Lewis Lodge from Hobart, whose officers carried out the ceremony.

When his second degree was scheduled, St Andrew Lewis brethren went to Hobart to reciprocate the visit and again Victory Lewis officers did the work.

By the time W Bro Clarke's third degree came around he had moved to Hobart and affiliated with Victory Lewis.

On the occasion of W Bro Clarke's last night as Worshipful Master of Victory Lewis, forty years ago, he officially welcomed an affiliate into the Lodge.

That affiliate was W Bro Gilbert - the very same presenting officer at W Bro Clarke's "Sixty Year presentation night" at Macquarie Lodge.

The presenting officer said W Bro Clarke embodied the principles of masonry - direct, honest and always willing to assist.

W Bro Clarke responded by saying he was "a Northerner" and had worked there. After five and a half years in the RAAF he applied for membership of St Andrew Lewis but before being officially accepted he had moved to Hobart to embark on an engineering course at the University of Tasmania.

W Bro Clarke referred to his year as Worshipful Master as "one which I anticipated with great pleasure" although after the installation in August his Secretary died suddenly, making the first few months rather busy while he acted in both positions.

Later in February, the Hobart bushfires severely affected a number of Victory Lewis members. Many of the unaffected members rallied and much time was spent in fence building, undertaking repairs, assisting house moves and other assistance.

W Bro Clarke still remembers the year with pride in his team.
